## PRAISE THE LORD WITH JOYFUL CRY

About the Writer of the Hymn Text: Dr. Fred Kaan was born in Holland but is a minister in England. He began writing hymns in 1960. As the minister of his church, he not only prepares a sermon each Sunday, but often writes a new hymn text on the theme of the sermon as well. He likes to write hymns on subjects that interest people today. Since many people live in cities, Dr. Kaan's hymns are often about the city. He also writes hymns that are closely related to the Bible. This is especially true about the hymn "Praise the Lord with Joyful Cry." (Psalm 150).

III Psalm Singing. Psalms were often sung antiphonally, that is with two groups of alternating singers. Divide your choir into two groups. Have group one sing the first two lines of each stanza and group two sing the second two lines. Choose someone from each group to accompany this hymn with appropriate percussion. For example:

Stanza 1: Tambourine Stanza 2: Add Triangle Stanza 3: Add Hand Drum 

IV Psalms were also sung responsorially, using a soloist alternating with a choir. Choose a soloist from each choir to sing the first two lines of stanzas one and two. Have the choir sing the last two lines of stanzas one and two. All join in on stanza three.
