

II. Free Instrumental Accompaniment

This hymn is an excellent choral call to worship. Add the random bell sounds provided for each stanza to achieve an effect of praise and joy as the rising sun greets the new day. A melodic instrument may be used to reinforce the voices as they sing in unison above the free accompaniment. This hymn may also be sung antiphonally with one group singing "May Jesus Christ Be praised!" and the other singing the remaining parts.
