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A whole note looks like this: • and receives beats.

Look through your music and circle all the whole notes.

We sing whole notes at the end of every phrase, don't we? Circle the word under each whole note. Let's practice holding these notes/words for four counts.


Read or sing measures 5-8.

Read or sing measures 9-13.

Read or sing measures 15-18 (verse 1).

Read or sing measures 19-22 (verse 1).

Practice drawing whole notes on the staff below. Try to fit your whole note inside the space between two lines or exactly centered on a line.



The Quarter Rest

A quarter rest looks like this: and receives _____ beat.

Look through your music and circle all the quarter rests.

A quarter rests begins every phrase we sing together, doesn't it? Rests in music are moments to be silent, but they are not moments where *nothing* is happening. During each quarter rest in this song, we need to something very important: *breathe!* Let's practice taking in a super singer's breath when we see the guarter rest in our music.

Read or sing measures 5-8.

Read or sing measures 9-13.

Read or sing measures 15-18 (verse 2).

Read or sing measures 19-22 (verse 2).
